It's true that the main floor of the Little Stone Church That Rocks can be pretty unbearable in the summer. The heat takes over, and thankfully, it takes a little time before it reaches the basement. As a person who lives in a historic home with minimal air conditioning, the RE space downstairs feels like a sanctuary in the summer.

Also, there is less church programming as we all enjoy a change of rhythm for the season. This makes what I term "the basement project" ideal summer work. Last summer was the third summer in a row wherein I took time to sort through the RE supplies to see what we've run out of, what we have too much of, what I'll use, what I won't, and to find homes for what stays.

The first summer, I tackled the office and cataloging all of the curricula owned by the RE program. The second summer, I worked a bit on the main basement area but primarily focused on the books as I put together a database to help me plan programs around what we already have.

I also found a carful of things to donate, a lot to recycle, and a few things that went in the trash. Since I moved into the office a couple of years ago, it also got a quick second sort.

Outside, the weather is now chill and grey. I arrive on Sunday mornings thankful for the heat after the walk through clouded breath to set up the Exploration space for our Explorers. The area downstairs is still a sanctuary, albeit a warm one now. I feel gratitude for the summer's work that allows the rest of the year to flow so smoothly.

The World Central Kitchen can will be on the table in the parlor each Sunday during coffee hour. We are also collecting deposit bottles and cans on the third Sunday of each month to go to Kids in the Congo which is a charity that helps provide funds to educate children in The Congo. The effort to help migrants in Sturbridge is currently focusing on purchasing bi-lingual books for the library in Sturbridge. We have started a Welcome Blanket project where we will be making handmade items to be given to immigrants to welcome them to this country. We will also be starting up another Vote Forward initiative soon in advance of the 2024 election.
